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#### SUPPLEMENTARY SELF STUDY REPORT FOR RE - ACCREDITATION

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#### Summary

#### **CRITERION I: CURRICULAR ASPECTS**

Post Graduate Government College, Sec 11, Chandigarh, right from its inception in 1953 has been a premier institute in the region with a vision of academic excellence, creativity and multifaceted development in its students. The college strives to impart critical thinking to create a mindset of progressive and inclusive worldview with a scientific temper.

The college, being affiliated to the Panjab University, Chandigarh (PU), implements the curriculum designed by the Board of Studies of the University for various disciplines. However, several faculty members of the college are also members of the Academic Council and the Board of Studies thus ensuring effective communication of suggestions for improvements.

The college admits students to 17 different undergraduate programmes and has 24 departments. It is the only government college in northern India which offers an undergraduate four year programme in physical education (B.P.Ed). Three courses i.e. BBA, BCA and M.Sc. (I.T) are self-financing.

The college also offers admission to six PG courses and coordinates with respective departments of the Panjab University for guidance and utilization of their resources. It is the only government institute affiliated to Panjab University which has earned the status of Research Centre in Physical Education, under which the college is offering an M. Phil. and a Ph. D. Programme.

The college has an organized set up for the successful implementation of the curriculum. The IQAC (Internal Quality Assurance Cell) is the regulatory body that monitors and evaluates the effectiveness of curriculum delivery. The members of faculty prepare weekly schedules and e-content of the syllabi to upload on the college website. PowerPoint presentations and classroom discussions support this. Several ICT (Information Communications Technology) supported smart classrooms are operational. As many as 56 laptops have been provided to the faculty members for the facilitation of the Teaching/Learning process

The college library has a collection of 1,12,699 books, 15 journals (hardcopies), 70 periodicals and INFLIBNET facility as well as other free databases, which has been a big asset for teachers and students.

The physical education courses get the advantage of the vast grounds of the college with the latest equipment and facilities which includes a Physiotherapy center, swimming pool, gymnasium, basketball courts, 400m cinder track, to mention a few.

Field trips and visits for the students to the recognized institutes/different outdoor locations such as PU, PGIMER, CSIO, IMTECH, EDII, Survey of India and Metrological Department, have been invariably organized by the college which have been instrumental in improving and supplementing what has been delivered on the college campus.

The curriculum enrichment is further achieved by arranging seminars, workshops and lectures from experts (from P.U., IISER, PEC University, CSIO, DRDO). Various competitions and events related to the curriculum are being held in the college. The CSIO (Central Scientific Instrument Organization) has agreed to adopt the college for creative learning pedagogy and to support training and development programme of the faculty.

The Personality Development Programme (PDP) in collaboration with Regional Institute of English (RIE) has been beneficial in improving the language skills and employability quotient of the students.

The Career Counseling and Placement cell of the college works in coordination with the academic session to make the students aware about the dynamic (global and Indian) market requirements. Various coaching/training institutes and employment agencies hold seminars and workshops so that the students improve on their discussion and presentation skills. Joint Job fests are held in the college where many students get placed/shortlisted in various companies. In the last two job fests 1599 students have been placed/shortlisted. College has signed 11 MOU's for the placement and practical training of the students.

Students participate actively in sports, co-curricular and extracurricular activities at College, University, National and International level and are also enrolled in NCC (army, navy and air force wing), NSS and eight societies that ensures their holistic development.

The college is in the process of getting affiliation from Panjab University for four undergraduate, four diploma and two masters courses.

#### **Criterion II: Teaching-Learning and Evaluation**

The college which is one of the foremost institutions, with its motto 'higher and still higher' endeavoured to be a centre of excellence in higher education with focus on innovative teaching, learning, research and evaluation in building a creative, enlightened and productive civil society. It strives to provide the students with knowledge, skill, values and sensitivity necessary for a successful citizen. The college has followed the rules and regulations of the Panjab University, Chandigarh administration as well as UGC.

The college has adopted a well planned mechanism in the process of admission. The information about admission is widely published on the college website as well as in daily newspapers of English, Hindi and Punjabi. Applications are invited online through a website: <u>www.dhechd.org</u> of Chandigarh administration. The prospectus was available online and it was free of cost. The admission was completely computerised, based on merit and spot counselling and was reviewed by IQAC periodically in order to make it convenient and effective.

The college has followed both merit and entrance test- cum- interview system as per the guidelines of the Panjab University. In B.Com, BBA, B.Sc. (Medical, Non Medical, Computer science and Bio Tech-Elective and Honours, Micro-Biology) and BCA courses centralized admission method was adopted. The college fully adheres to the norms for socially deprived and economically poor sections, S.C., S.T., OBC, single-girl child, wards of Defence personnel, Cancer/AIDS Thalassemia Patients, Physically Challenged Persons, transgender, Border Area Students, Kashmir Displaced Persons, J&K Students/ Kargil Martyrs etc.

The college is running the programmes like B.A, B.Sc. (Medical, Non Medical, Computer Science, Bio Technology, Microbiology), BCA, B.Com, BBA and B.P.Ed at under graduation level. M.Sc. in Chemistry, Professional Studies (IT); M.A in History, English and Punjabi are courses offered at Post Graduation level. The college offers Honours courses in third, fourth, fifth and sixth semesters in the streams like Arts, Commerce and Science. The college is also running self financing courses like BBA, BCA and M.Sc. in Information Technology. M.Phil. and Ph.D courses are offered in Physical Education department. 30 scholars are pursuing their Ph.D under the supervision of 11 faculty members of different departments such as History, Sociology, Punjabi, Zoology, Physical Education and English.

The college has prescribed some rules related to admission, regularity, punctuality, conduct, attendance, rules in respect of examination etc., to ensure discipline in the college. Orientation programmes are organised before the commencement of classes to acclimatise the new entrants to different aspects of the college. The students are continuously evaluated and assessed through the process of examination, assessment, class presentation, attendance in class, observation of behaviour and conduct, communication skills, seminars and other activities. The college has transparent assessment system in the examinations which keep the students' committed, disciplined and sincere towards studies as well as towards institution.

Personality development classes are conducted in the college to enhance communication skill and employability quotient of students. Counselling is also provided to address various challenges faced by students. Eight societies are constituted to sensitize the staff and students of the college on issues like gender, inclusion, environment etc. by organizing workshops, camps, awareness programmes, seminars, extension lectures, rallies, candle march, marathon, street plays, poster making and slogan writing competitions etc. There are Anti-Ragging Cell, Drug Awareness Committee, Gender Equity Society, Anti Sexual Harassment Committee, Environment Committee etc.

The meritorious and advanced learner students are duly awarded with prizes and certificates on the basis of marks secured in previous examinations like mid-semester and semester, attendance, punctuality and outstanding achievements in NSS, NCC and sports activities which encourage them to expose their potentialities and participate in higher level of skills. The institution is committed to cater to the needs of all sections of the society and exhibit overall inclusiveness. Special care has been taken for differently-abled and visually impaired students. The JAWS –a talking software has been installed in the college while Braille sheets are distributed free of cost. Despite the heritage nature of the college main building, the proposal for the construction of a ramp in the same for differently-abled students is in the process. However, a well maintained ramp is there in the newly constructed Bio Technology Block of the college.

Apart from the conduct of college and university examinations, conduct of educational trips, study tours, industrial visits, visit to chemical factories, visit to meteorological department, survey of India, market surveys and deliverance of lecturers by eminent scholars are substantially contributing to teaching-learning process. The IQAC has immensely contributed to the teaching-learning process in the college by documenting various programmes which are leading to quantitative and qualitative improvements.

The learning which is being imparted in the college is mostly student-centric. The teachers follow interactive and participatory learning processes. They teach through chalk and talk (black board), PPT; interact session, Assignments, organizing weekly seminars and conducting periodical examinations such as house test/mid semester, special test, semester examinations etc.

The college organized different competitions like essay writing contest, debate, declamation contest, quiz, poem writing, poetry recitation, slogan writing, story writing competitions, departmental fests which inspire and encourage the students in creative and innovative activities. It also organizes seminars, conferences, workshops, extension/ expert lectures etc., which helped both students and faculty members in academic pursuits.

The college has a very good and well stocked online Library. The library has introduced a new feature of transaction messaging through SMS and e-mail. Our library has done a pioneering work in uploading previous years question papers of both P.G and UG and pending degrees online. Every year the college library provides free books and stationery to 300 students. In the library there are 1,12,699 Books, 70 periodicals, 15 journals, 17 News papers (8 double copies), 325 CDs and cassettes, more than 6000 e-journals and 30,00,000 eBooks through INFLIBNET. The Library has a Braille Corner for visually challenged students. The library emails daily news clippings related to college and Panjab University. In the library a separate Research Cell has been established.

Professional counselling, mentoring and academic advices are provided to the students for their betterment. Feedback by students, tutorial and remedial classes, periodical examinations, extension lectures by resource persons etc, are undertaken to maintain the quality of education. The students are sensitized about their rights and duties through a plethora of activities held throughout the year. The students are provided with counselling service and medical facilities by the counselling cell and health centre located in the college.

Hostel facilities for both boys and girls students and sport facilities with a well maintained ground, swimming pool, gymnasium etc. are other sources of inspiration and encouragement to the students

The college has highly qualified, efficient and dedicated faculty members most of whom have Ph.D and M. Phil degrees and are NET qualified. There are 03 professors, 43 Associate Professors and 77 Assistant Professors. Besides, to meet the additional workload of classes, 81 resource persons, majority of whom UGC-NET qualified, are engaged in different departments on per period basis. The teachers are trained enough to use latest electronic devices like smart boards, power point presentations, internet, LCD projectors, scanner etc., and to learn and keep abreast of the latest developments and to innovate, continuously seek improvement in their work and strive for individual and institutional excellence.

To enrich the faculty members, the college encourages them to register for Ph.D (those who are non-Ph.D) and D.Litt programmes and participate in orientation programmes, refresher courses, seminars, conferences, symposiums and workshops organized by various universities and institutions. The faculty members are also running different research projects sponsored by different national bodies like UGC, ICSSR, CSIR, and Department of Science and Technology. The college organized various training programmes for teachers from time to time to update their knowledge, research and teaching/pedagogical skills.

Members of teaching faculty for eruditeness and intelligence are invited by different organizations and institutions as resource persons and subject experts. The college has the system of evaluation of teachers by students through a confidential feedback system which is aimed at improvement of teaching –learning process. The college organized workshops on syllabus of different subjects sponsored by the Education Department, Chandigarh Administration which recommended job oriented, highly relevant and skill enhancing syllabus as per the UGC guidelines. It also organised workshops on Faculty Development sponsored by RUSA and Department of Science and Technology, Government of India.

The college has outstanding learning outcomes which are best reflected in the result statement. Every year and in each semester, our students perform exceedingly well. The college pass percentage is always much higher than the university pass percentage and many of our students secure good positions in the Panjab University examinations. The college analyses the outcomes of the students, particularly the result, pass percentage, and overall achievements. The college also monitors and ensures the achievement of learning outcomes through IQAC and by taking feedback/advices from the members of the Alumni Association, parents, retired colleagues, press/public opinion etc. The college, since its inception has produced a good number of meritorious students some of whom are presently at the high helm of the society. To name few are **Justice J.S. Khehar**, the chief justice of Supreme Court, **Justice Swatantra Kumar**, presently the Director of the National Green Tribunal and cabinet minister (minister for Skill Development) of centre **Mr. Rajiv Pratap Singh Rudy.** 

#### **Criterion III: Research, Consultancy and Extension**

The troika of teaching, research and extension activities truly facilitates the pursuit of excellence that the institution is engaged in since its inception. The primary focus is to develop a research culture which would have a far reaching and beneficial impact on the 'City Beautiful' in particular and society in general. Through its many extension activities, the institution seeks to create a meaningful relationship between classroom teaching and community thus creating a milieu in which all stakeholders are meaningfully engaged in creation of a better tomorrow.

The IQAC cell of the college acts as a nodal center to promote excellence in research. Adequate initiatives have been taken to promote research at the college and the existing 'Research Centre' in the subject of Physical Education is well guided by its own research board. The institution has M.Phil and PhD programmes in Physical Education and 90 days' internship is provided to the B.Ped students. There is provision for Inter Disciplinary Research at the Department. The research scholars from outside the campus are allowed to conduct the research in the college campus, avail the resources from the college library and make use of lab gadgets like 'Gait Analysis', 'Body Composition Analyser' and others. Moreover Research Centre for the subject of History is under consideration with Panjab University Chandigarh. The institution to further the cause of research and knowledge sharing in different disciplines has uploaded on the college website 11 E- journals, which are peer reviewed and are awaiting their approval and ISSN NO. In addition to the above ,IQAC cell of the college closely monitors the ongoing projects and their adherence to the stipulated guidelines

The college has 3 Professors, 43 Associate Professors and 77 Assistant Professors who are the core academic strength .The faculty members are continuously engaged in broadening their academic horizon, and the testimony to this fact is the 11 Ph.D degree awarded cutting across disciplines. Moreover, 11 faculty members are pursuing their Doctoral studies. Dr. Benudhar Patra from Department of History is pursuing D.Litt from Behrampur University, Orissa, on "Urban Centres and Urbanization in Early Orissa".

To support the researchers in right earnest, the College library provides access to On-line journals (numbering 6000 plus), E - books (numbering 30 lakh plus) and all the printed books in the library. The Research Committee facilitates research guidance and information dissemination to teaching staff and students about the various funding agencies.

Currently 11 faculty members are actively involved in guiding/supervising research work of 30 research scholars. In a continuous endeavor to promote interdisciplinary research the Research committee encourages the language departments to do collaborative work in the field of translation. Furthermore the Research committee motivates the faculty of each department to publish articles in national and international journals and ensures timely release of funds from the funding agencies to promote research activities.

The faculty members are actively involved in University bodies like **Board of Studies**, **Academic Councils and as added members in the faculty, panel of judges, Honorary Advisor** and **as member of various screening and evaluation committees**. The number of books authored by faculty members with ISBN No. is **56**. The total number of chapters contributed in edited volume is **105**whereas 7 books have been edited by faculty numbers. Moreover **62** publications are to the credit of faculty members which include popular writing, poems and journalistic musings. A total of **637** papers have been published in international and national/state journals with ISSN no.The totalnumberof citation index of the publications by the faculty is 1320. In addition Department of history has chronicled the history of the heritage college and has published it under the title **"Post Graduate Government College, Sector-11, Chandigarh:Past and Present"** Edited by Dr.KantaSinghania, 2012, Unistar Books Private Limited, Chandigarh.[**ISBN No.9789382246510**]

The institution has a highly enriching academic output as **413** papers have been presented at international/national level seminars, symposia, conferences .Moreover **34** Faculty members with distinct specialization are qualified to act as Research guide. **184** scholars of eminence from India and abroad , have visited the campus to interact and share their expertise with teachers and students.

Up till now 3 major and 4 minor research project funded by UGC/ Chandigarh Administration have been completed. The three ongoing research projects are;

[i] Dr. Baljeet Singh is working on a three year UGC Major Project (UGC-MAJOR-MATH-2013-2149) on " **Wave Propagation in Porothermoelastcity**" since July, 2015;

[ii] Dr. Monika Aggarwal is working on UCG sponsored Project on 'Awareness of Financial Literacy among Youth' since July 2016.

[iii] Dr. Jagdish Kaur is working on UGC sponsored project on 'Mosquito Diversity of Baddi (HP) and Surrounding Areas: Impact of Demographic and Developmental Changes' since September 2016.

To appreciate the pursuit of academic excellence, all the achievements of the teachers are acknowledged in the College Annual Report and in the 'News Section' of the College magazine. Entries of all such achievements are made in the Annual confidential Reports of the concerned teachers.

For encouraging Consultancy related activities the 'institute-industry' interface primarily focuses on arranging educational tours for the students to industrial houses/manufacturing units. People from industries too visit the college to provide hands on training to the students on the latest knowhow in their area of expertise. The department of Physical Education provides consultancy in the areas of field marking, health and fitness and physiotherapy. The department was engaged as consultants for conducting "Physical fitness Test" for the prospective security guards for PGIMER, Chandigarh.

Moreover the Career Counselling and Placement Cell of the college regularly organize discussions/lectures with the industry and market people so as to develop awareness amongst students about the latest employability trends. The Cell also facilitates as a platform to

facilitate the Campus Recruitment of the students, and 2 'Mega Job Fest' held in February 2016[709 offers were made to students] and September 2016 [890 offers were made to students] is a testimony to the institution's commitment towards the future of its students. The Job Fest is inclusive in nature and extends its reach to whole of North India and many national and international companies/firms come for recruitment for various job profiles. Many of our alumni have done their alma mater proud by joining 'Civil services' (national and state level), 'Judicial services', IT industry, three wings of Indian Armed Forces, Para military organization and other sectors. The College has signed 11 Memorandum of Understanding [MOU] with various organizations and entered into collaborations and agreements to stimulate industry academia interface.

The extension activities complement students' academic learning experience by adding to their knowledge and experience. The skill of comprehending things against a wider canvas and in the right perspective gets inculcated in them. Through the extension activities the students get in touch with the practical aspects of life. They learn teamwork, leadership skills, decision making etc while participating in these activities. The Government College Dramatic Club [GCDC] regularly stages plays and 'NukkadNatak' on various burning issues like water conservation, violence against women, youth and drugs and others. Every department ,throughout the year organizes extension activities for students on days of national and international importance in their respective streams.

The institution promotes students' service to community through community outreach programmes held under the aegis of different societies like:

- The AIDS Awareness and Public Health Society;
- The Best Out of Waste Society;
- The Community Hygiene and Sanitation Society;
- The Drug De-Addiction Society [SCADA];
- ✤ The Gender Equity Society ;
- Preservation and Promotion of Heritage Society ;
- Environment Awareness society;
- Traffic Awareness and Road Safety.

The institution enrolls 500 students for its NSS unit who actively participate in various community outreach programmes at University, National, State and International level. The NSS volunteers have won 40 awards at various levels. Following the dictum "The beginning is always today," the students are ever ready to serve the deprived sections of the society. The institution along with its students, faculty members is always at the forefront in doing their best for the community. Some of the notable and heartwarming humane activities are Blankets distribution drive for New Born babies, Support to 'Spirit of India Run' ', Tree Plantation Camp at Chief Minister Haryana residence, celebrating 70 years of "Azaadi-YaadkaroQurbaani"; "TiranagaYatra" ,and celebrating **'Bharat** SwaachAbhiyaan" on Father of the Nation – Bapu's Birthday. The N.S.S. unit of the college has adopted two villages of the U.T. Govt. (KhuddaLahora&Khudda Ali Sher) and the students with the help of Programme Officers organize awareness programmes on various social issues for the residents of these two villages.

The premier Heritage college of City Beautiful boasts of a short course swimming pool [25 meters], which is not only used by college students but is a practice site for NCC Naval cadets too. Moreover faculty members and students from other government institutions make use of the swimming pool facilities.

The college organizes three Blood Donation Camps in every academic session and about 550 students/Faculty members donate the blood in these camps. For the extension lectures and the community outreach programmes, the institution has sufficient funds under the head called 'Amalgamated Fund (AF)' and PDP fund.

The institution ensures the involvement of the community in its outreach activities by involving the students and tracking their progress in Tutorial Group Meetings held throughout the academic session. Creating awareness amongst the youth on various issues locally and globally is the biggest contribution made towards the community development of tri-city and beyond.

The 3 wings of NCC (Army, Naval and Air) serve as a fountainhead to imbibe cherished values of nation building among the enrolled cadets. The combined enrolled strength of the cadets for the three units is 290 cadets. The cadets take part in various activities including training on and off the campus throughout the year. Some of the prominent camps attended by the cadets are 'Pre-RDC' camp, 'Republic Day parade' camp, Air Force Attachment Camp, 'Vayu Sena' Camp, 'ThalSena' Camp, 'NauSainik' Camp. Many cadets participate in adventure sports held by respective units. 51 NCC cadets have brought laurels to the institution at state, national and international level while participating in camps and at other competitive events. It is a matter of great honor and pride that two of our alumni made the highest sacrifice while serving the nation. The two martyrs are **Late Major MayurJamwal 6 Sikh Regiment, Late Lt. Amit Kumar Beniwal, 8 Bihar** who gave up their lives for the nation.

True to its motto 'Higher and Still Higher' the institution cherishes the development of its faculty members and student community alike by supporting their professional development in a learning ambience. There is a sustained endeavor to encourage innovative ideas by offering programmatic support for learning, teaching, and research in partnership with faculty and other researchers across India and beyond.

#### **CRITERION IV: INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES**

Established in 1953, the college is spread over 43.8 acres including 5 acres in General Hostel. The campus provides excellent infrastructure and facilities to the students to excel in the fields of academics, sports, recreation and social responsibility by providing knowledge, skill and values. There is emphasis on interactive teaching through smart class rooms, interactive boards, power point presentations, classroom discussions and visual aids. There is a well equipped library with INFLIBNET database, laboratories, botanical, herbal & cosmic gardens with spice village, seminar rooms, museum, faculty research centre and language workstation. There are separate teaching blocks for I.T., B.Com and BBA. There is a newly constructed Bio-Technology block with air-conditioned Labs and Seminar room. The building and its infrastructure is displayed in the form of 3D model.

The sports complex has sports pavilion, swimming pool and multipurpose Gymnasium hall, Cinder track (400 m), Football & Hockey fields, Basket ball, Volleyball, Lawn tennis, Badminton, Net ball and Handball courts, Putting Pitch for Golf along with Physiotherapy room and Health Centre having Sanitary Napkin vending machine with incinerator. Ours is the only Physical Education department in the city that has pole-vault and high jump landing pit (Olympics standard), steeple chase equipment along with other research lab equipments.

There are three hostels having common rooms, Library, Internet and TV facilities for 650 resident students. Girls'.hostel has dispensary with a resident nurse. Water purifiers ensure safe drinking water in hostels. Boosters are installed for proper supply of water in the campus. There is On-Campus residential facility for the Principal, Chief Warden, Hostel Wardens, Nurse, Class IV employees and two guest houses in the main hostel.

College library is spacious, automated, air-conditioned and under e-surveillance. It has 10,197 sq feet covered area divided in different sections. There are 1,12,700 books, more than 6000 e-journals, 30,00,000 e-books & 200 rare books. It has an average number of 600 daily walk-ins with approximately 150 books issued to them daily. Library has 5000 books in its book-bank. With the help of information and communications technology library books and journals can be easily accessed. We are pioneers in the field of providing information of transactions to borrowers through SMS and emails. To appreciate and express our gratitude to the architect of city beautiful 'Le Corbusier' 'Heritage Corner' is showcased. There is a Faculty Research Centre with 5 tables having computers with Wi-Fi and LAN facilities to facilitate research and publications. For feedback from students, suggestion box is kept in the library and the recommendations of library advisory committee are considered for regular purchase of text books, reference books and journals. Two Perkins Braillers and 'Talking Jaws Software' are available for visually challenged students. In addition all Post Graduate departments have their own departmental libraries.

The institute has latest I.T. facilities with 238 desktop computers. 56 laptops have been given to faculty members for curriculum delivery, research and administrative work. There is LAN network in entire campus with 4 Wi-Fi connections to ensure Wi-Fi connectivity in all the departments in addition to broadband connections under National Mission for Education through Information and Communication Technology. Chandigarh Administration gives grant for upgradation and maintenance of computers. E-content by faculty members to share their knowledge is uploaded on the college website and is freely available to students globally.

Campus is equipped with CCTV cameras, Electronic Display Boards, automatic electronic bell, Biometric and Face Reading Machine and Electronic Data Processing (EDP) cell.

There is an all women SBI branch with ATM facility available in the campus.

Solar Panels are installed on the roofs of College building as a part of green initiative to generate 435 KW of power.

The proposal for opening of a day care centre for children of staff members and recreation room for students (sponsored by alumni association of the college) are in the pipeline. At present we are utilizing the day care facility provided by neighbouring college.

The maintenance of the college campus building and furniture is done by Maintenance Department U.T., Chandigarh. New purchases upto 1 lakh are done with the approval Director Higher Education. For the purchase of items costing more than 1 lakh, the constituted Central Purchase Committee of Chandigarh Administration is authorized and for purchases costing more than 2 lakh e-tendering procedure is followed. The upkeep of green areas of the college is done by gardeners and for maintaining cleanliness and sanitation the college has deployed sweepers. Internal Quality Assurance Committee (IQAC) along with college infrastructure development committee and purchase committee regularly monitors and evaluates the infrastructure to ensure its timely up-gradation.

However our college building enjoys heritage status given by Chandigarh Administration and utmost care is taken to preserve its heritage character.

#### **CRITERION V: STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION**

The admission process in the college commences with the publication of a joint Prospectus (of all government colleges of Chandigarh) that carries detailed information regarding courses offered, number of seats in each course, admission schedule, admission procedure, course wise fee structure, examination system, extra-curricular activities, college rules and other facilities provided by the college. This year, the joint prospectus was launched by our college. Moreover to attract the best from across the country the department of Physical Education-Teacher Education, Learning and Research advertised its admission notice in leading dailies of the country. An orientation programme is organised at the beginning of every session to make the students aware about various offices of the college, extracurricular activities, various scholarships, free ships available to the students belonging to SC/ST/OBC, differently- abled and economically weaker sections. The foreign students are taken care of by a committee formed for this purpose. Parent Teacher Meets are arranged from time to time by the college. A special cell in the college looks after the problems of differently- abled students. Separate bathroom facility is also made available to blind and differently abled persons. Two Braillers and Talking Jaw software are in service for blind students in the library. The college organizes special Personality Development classes for providing opportunities to the students for their career growth and overall personality development in addition to their academic growth. Free coaching classes for competitive examinations such as UGC-NET, bank officers examinations etc and free remedial classes for slow learners are organized for the students. Some special incentives, financial as well as non- financial (such as fee concession, free stationary, text books, free remedial classes, and coaching classes for competitive examination) are provided to the students belonging to the reserved categories and economically weaker section. Anti-ragging Cell, Grievance Redressal Cell, Cell for Prevention of Sexual Harassment and tutorial groups are various mechanisms to redress the grievances of students. Library orientation programmes are organized annually for the new entrants in order to educate them and to create awareness about the value and importance of reading good books. For developing the competitive spirit among the students, the library organizes competitive activities viz. book/reference hunting, essay-writing, slogan-writing, poster-making, collage making etc.

Entrepreneurial skills of students get boost through talks organized by Placement Cell, Entrepreneurial Cell (in collaboration with Alumni Association), Environment Cell and through active participation in organizing various departmental/society/ college functions. Linkages with other institutions are established to enhance the employment skill and placement of students. For this purpose 11 MOUs with various institutions and organizations are signed by the college. Two Joint Mega Job Fests were organised by our college in which prospective job seekers from North India participated.

The students are encouraged and motivated to participate in various co-curricular and extracurricular activities organised by eight interdisciplinary societies, departmental societies, Inter-college competitions, Panjab University Zonal Youth & Heritage Festival, which are held at state, national and international levels. College also endeavours to motivate them by honouring them in specially organized functions. The Panjab University Zonal Youth & Heritage Festival of this year was hosted by the college. The college has Naval Wing, Air Wing, Army Wing, NSS unit for the overall development of the students. Regular sports activities including seven days Annual Sports Festival are organized to inculcate the spirit of healthy sportsmanship among the students. A swimming pool is also available to the students. To keep the students physically fit, a multipurpose gymnasium hall is also provided in the college campus. The health centre of the college provides facility of first aid as well as physiotherapy.

The students share their information and ideas on various issues in the college magazine, "The Vikas" since 1958. Wall magazines brought out by various departments provide information for academic and co-curricular activities. Prize distribution function is an annual event to honor the achievers with Roll of Honor & College Color in academic and co-curricular activities. The Alumni Association of college is a forum to facilitate interaction among the Alumni so that our students remain connected with their alma mater. The college student council is elected every year to develop the leadership quality among the students. The college celebrates various days of international and national importance such as "Independence Day", "Republic Day", "Voters' Day" and other days of national importance to inculcate patriotic and moral values among the students. Parent Teacher Meet is arranged from time to time by the college.

Faculty feedback is also taken from the students through feedback Proformas. To sustain consistently high standards and also to monitor quality of instruction, Annual Confidential Report (ACR) of employees is filled every year. When the companies come for campus recruitment, the feedback is taken in terms of future skill sets that need to be incorporated into the curriculum and students personality, so as to make them ready for the job market.

#### **CRITERIA VI: GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT**

'Higher and Still Higher', the motto of the college, is appropriate in true sense for students and staff as it propels them to strive higher for academic excellence and make better citizens by giving them opportunity to serve the society.

The Principal of the college acts as a planner, motivator, evaluator, administrative head and academic leader. He has the autonomy to govern the institution within the purview of the rules and regulations framed by the government. He along with the dean, Vice Principal, Advisory committee and (Internal quality assurance committee) IQAC appoints the conveners for various committees including teaching and non-teaching staff which play an important role in the planning and implementation of activities in different spheres of institutional functioning.

Director Higher Education holds periodic meetings with the Principal; and the principal with the IQAC, departmental heads and committee in charges modify and finalize the plans of action. Principal delegates the functional authority to the dean, vice principal, departmental heads and society in charges. He also reviews the working and progress from time to time.

Principal along with various members are involved in developmental activities of the college such as infrastructure, examination, evaluation, academics and extracurricular activities.

The Principal, administrative officers, faculty members, coordinators of various committees and deserving students are encouraged to attend leadership training programmes organized by national or local institutions. Faculty and administrative staff is recruited as per the Govt. and UGC guidelines.

The institution collaborates with different sections/ departments of the institution by holding periodic meetings to improve the quality of its educational provisions. The decentralized functioning mechanism empowers the faculty and enables them in making independent decisions to achieve their targets. However, there are sufficient checks and balances built in the system to see that these decisions are taken carefully.

Student leadership is encouraged by holding elections to enrich the democratic ethos amongst the newly turned voters and to inculcate political sensitization. Student council acts as a fountain head for tomorrow's vibrant democracy. The student representatives work on student's issues and help the faculty in organizing college functions and taking decisions. All the students are in enrolled eight societies to develop good character and make them socially responsible.

Keeping in view the quality changes required for the development of the college, the admissions to various ongoing and new courses is based on students' academic records and requirements of the job scenario. Apart from the lecture method of teaching, group discussions, field studies, visits to Industries and institutes, debates, tutorials, seminars, workshops and study tours are undertaken. Faculty is encouraged for research and academic development. Eminent Scholars of PU and other institutes of repute are invited to deliver special lectures and talks.

The college follows the self- appraisal method to evaluate the performance of faculty. HR is managed by way of engaging resource persons and technical experts for various courses.

A well equipped, digitalized library with INFLIBNET data base is available for the optimum use by the students and faculty. The library is in the process of digitalizing college magazine 'Vikas' since its inception in 1956, previous PU question papers for graduate and post graduate classes since 2014 and data of pending degrees in the college since 1958. Faculty research centre is available in the library to facilitate the staff members for research and publications.

The college has a recognized research centre in Physical Education Department duly approved by the affiliating university. Eleven teachers have completed their Ph.D in recent years and eleven teachers are guiding 30 research scholars for Ph.D and publications.

The students, through NCC, NSS and different societies are encouraged to undertake community-oriented activities like health-hygiene awareness, medical camps, adult education and literacy, blood donation, AIDS awareness, environmental awareness and road safety etc. These activities are held on campus and off campus.

The college gets feedback from internal and external stakeholders with regard to teaching quality, curriculum, extra-curricular activities and infrastructural demands. Committees are constituted with teacher representatives for planning and implementation of activities in different spheres of institutional functioning.

There are certain recommendations made by the Administration & College Council that have been implemented viz. online admission of students, Parent-Teachers Meet, co-education for B.A and B.Com, CCTV cameras, faculty research centre in college library, biometric attendance for staff, introduction of M.Phil in the Department of Physical Education, and up gradation of internet lease line from 2 mbps to 10 mbps.

The institute has a well defined Grievance Redressal Cell to address the problems of the students and staff. The complaints received are dealt with at level of faculty, department, dean, Chief Warden, examination committee and Anti-Ragging Cell, Anti Sexual Harassment Cell and Citizen Charter.

For faculty empowerment, the college organizes Computer Literacy Programs and faculty development programs for teaching and non-teaching employees. The college also conducts international and national seminars, workshops & conferences.

The planning and decision making in financial matters rests with the Administration and Principal. The college accounts are regularly audited by the audit team through its two tier audit system.

The college has a formally stated quality policy. The perspective plans and policies are prepared by the IQAC based on the activities proposed by various departments for the calendar

year. The plans and policies are finalized and submitted to the college council for scrutiny and implementation. The IQAC has been actively functioning in the college with the thrust on academic and administrative excellence wherein many lecturers have completed their Ph.D and several have undertaken research projects to upgrade their knowledge and skills. The Advisory Committee, Examination Committee, Discipline Committee, Purchase Committee, research committee and infrastructure development committee etc are constituted for quality assurance. Periodic review of administration and academic activities are undertaken to ensure that quality. The decisions of IQAC have resulted in upgradation of various facilities in the college and introduction of various new courses.

A Language lab under the aegis of RUSA has been sent for approval.

#### **Environmental consciousness:**

Our college is an eco friendly campus. The Principal and the faculty members are committed to provide an eco-friendly ambience in the institution.

**Tree plantation** drives and **cleanliness drives** are undertaken on regular basis. We have planted various **NASA prescribed** indoor plants which purify air in college campus. The college has **Cosmic Garden, Herbal Garden, Spice Village,** cocopeat cultivation, green house garden and vermincomposting. The college has 4.3 acres of land for **Botanical Garden** which acts as a green cover for carbon neutrality.

The college has been declared a **Smoking Free Zone** and **No Polythene Zone**. The **Environment Awareness Society** of the college deals specifically with environment related awareness-generation and sensitization activities. The volunteers of NSS Units of the college engage in **sanitation drives** and eco-friendly activities to create awareness amongst the students and society.

In a bid to go green the college has a provision of non conventional **solar energy** panels and LED lights to conserve energy and minimize energy consumptions.

The twin practice of **Rain Water Harvesting** and **Drip Irrigation System** is installed for sustainable conservation of water table. Since 2006, the college is equipped with Tertiary Waste Water Management which is used for irrigation of green belt to save ground water. 9 **Water purifiers** with regular AMC are installed to ensure safe drinking water.

For effective **e-waste management**, there is provision of dumping e-waste material in a separate store which is later on written off as per the norms laid by Chandigarh Administration.

#### **INNOVATIONS:**

The college has introduced several innovations in academic, administrative, social outreach and other levels of the college's functioning:

**ICT** aided teacher student learning through smart class rooms, e-content module, audio – visual aids, remedial classes, and periodical tutorials are used extensively. An Instrumentation lab is in the pipeline. There are two language work stations for improving the communication skills of the students. The project of **Language Lab** under the aiges of RUSA has been sent for approval.

In our approach from classroom to community, the **physiotherapy lab** caters to the society at large free of cost. A Day Care Centre is in the pipline. Presently this facility is available at the neighboring college. **Digital information boards** and **biometric attendance** for staff has been installed and implemented.

Various academic and 8 **interdisciplinary societies** supplement the teaching/education with community and extension activities so that the objective of institutional social responsibility is achieved. The college has started **11 online e journals** in different subjects for which ISSN number is applied for.

Entrepreneurship development is encouraged by establishing **Entrepreneurial Promotion Cell** in collaboration with the highly prestigious Alumni Association of the College.

A 100 hour **Personality Development Programme** for final year students is being conducted to train them not only in personality development but also in soft skills, group discussions, public speaking, interviews and presentation skills.

Special **counter for making Aadhar cards** of the students and staff was set up twice in the college premises and approximately 200 Aadhar cards were made and issued.

Our college has pioneered to make **passports of students and staff** of the college under the Scheme of 'Ministry of Foreign Affairs' wherein 15 passports have been received by the students and faculty.

To increase industry academia interface the college has signed 11 MOU's with various organizations and industries.

**CSIO** has adopted our college for scientific excellence and exposure.

As per directions of Govt. of India for good governance we are **transparent and accountable** to comply with the **Right to Information Act,** 2005.

**'Humanitarian Guardian Fund**' is generated wherein donations are given generously by the college staff. This fund is used for assisting the needy students for payment of fee and purchase of books and stationery.

**Faculty Research Centre** is established in thews library for research, publications by the faculty. Text books are collected by the library to be distributed to the needy students. Students are encouraged to minimize paper wastage and go online. **'Open Eye Foundation'** a club founded by our alumnus also collects and provides books to needy students in the college campus.

A unique book 'Post Graduate Govt. College sector 11, Chandigarh' 'Past and present' written with contributions from faculty of History and English dept.

**Electronic Data Processing cell** of the college implements internet connectivity, campus networking, website development and computerization of examination system.

The "Society for Creating Awareness against Drug Abuse' (SCAADA) works in conjuncture with the Counseling Center as well as the Anti Stress Helpline of the college. SCAADA endeavors to educate its members through activities in college and outreach programmes in neighboring rural areas.

**Cosmic Garden** based on scientific research is established which has been created in the campus to promote alternative medicine. A **Herbal Garden** has a variety of medicinal plants and herbs. A unique **Spice Village** with exotic herbs and spices has also been created. Indoor plants that act as air purifier are planted in college campus.

#### **BEST PRACTICES:**

**Hamari kaksha- A Class Apart** is a registered nongovernmental organization (NGO) working in the field of 'education for all' since 2003. It is run by teachers and student volunteers and is aimed at giving special training & enhancing personalities, values and skills of underprivileged children, especially dropouts and low-performers, as well as their illiterate mothers. Our motto is 'Potential Unlimited' where not only is the latent talent of these children explored and tapped but also a platform is provided to the young volunteers to make them socially aware and responsible. Chandigarh Administration, Panchkula Administration and The Sai Trust have very kindly provided us space to run our four branches where more than 500 underprivileged children come everyday in the evening. More than 200 students of college have volunteered in the NGO since last three years.

#### Joint Job fests:

**First joint job** Fest in collaboration with all the city Govt. colleges was organized in the month of Feb. 2016. More than 40 companies from various sectors including IT, Banks, Retailing etc. visited the college. Approximately, 1600 students participated in the job fest out of which 709 were shortlisted for different companies.

**Second job fest** was organized in the month of Sept 2016. More than 38 companies participated in the job fest where 890 students were shortlisted. It is the first ever time that personnels from defense forces were invited to interact with aspirants of Armed Forces.

Concentric, A BPO came to the campus and offered 15 appointment letters to students.

**ROSHNI KI AUR** group was started in 2013. The main aim of this group is to promote the sense of dignity and self confidence among the differently abled persons with special reference to special ability of visually challenged persons. 29 students from the college in the year 2015-16 were given financial assistance by the alumni. Twenty such students are well placed in various sectors.

The overall endeavor is to hold, guide and motivate the future generations to serve society in a selfless manner and live up to the college motto "Higher and Higher Still".

- The College brings out an **on-line prospectus** annually which provides details about the college including the courses offered, seats available in different streams, eligibility criteria, admission procedures, subject combination, infrastructure, evaluation system, fee structure, sports facilities, departmental societies, cultural and other co-curricular activities etc. This information is available on the website **www.dhechd.org**.
- The minimum eligibility criteria associated with each successive admission list for both general and special category of admission are according to the admission schedule of the Panjab University. The college carries out a multi-faceted and well planned admission process which is computerized and is widely publicized in daily news papers of English, Hindi and Punjabi. Applications are invited online through a website www.dhechd.org of the Chandigarh Administration. The prospectus is available online and is free of cost. The admission process adheres to the rules and reservation polices prescribed by the Panjab University, Chandigarh Administration as well as by UGC.
- The **Joint prospectus** for all Government colleges of Chandigarh was prepared and designed by our college which was launched by the Director Higher Education, Chandigarh administration in June 2016.
- The college **hostel admission** committee brings out its own Hand book of rules of information which provides details regarding the number of available seats, eligibility criteria and other requirements and facilities.
- In addition to Chandigarh Administration website, the college also uploads all the information regarding admission procedure separately on its website. It notifies details about available seats, admission and selection criteria and other procedures/ requirements. The students of professional studies i.e. M.Sc IT and BCA of the college assisted the applicants to fill up the forms online.
- Guidance and Counseling cell of teachers (**Help Desk**) advises the students and parents in better selection of subjects and courses. Several help/ counseling desks by student volunteers of NSS and NCC wings of the college also disseminate specific information on aspects such as the cut off percentages and location of admission venues etc.
- The **foreign students** both Self financed as well as sponsored by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Indian Council of Cultural Relations (ICCR) and Ministry of Home Affairs take admission in stream of their choice after getting eligibility certificate from the Panjab University.

#### ENSURING TRANSPARENCY

- The **process of admission** is conducted very smoothly and transparently by different admission committees comprising faculty and office staff under the complete guidance and **supervision of the college principal and IQAC**.
- The admission process involves scrutiny of each application and the accompanying documents at two levels: (a) the **scrutiny committee** and (b) the **admission committee** which strictly scrutinizes the forms checking the authenticity of the documents submitted by the candidates under the supervision of **IQAC** and the **Standing Committee for Monitoring Admissions (SCFMA).**
- In the admission of B.Com, BBA, BCA, B,Sc. (Medical and Non Medical, Computer Science) and BCA 1<sup>st</sup> semester centralized admission process is followed. The admission of B.A, M.A and M.Sc. Ist semester classes are strictly based on **merit and latest reservation norms.**
- To ensure transparency in admissions of B.P.Ed, M.PED and M.Phil in Physical Education, the college notifies on its notice boards and college website, well in advance, the availability of seats and the procedure of admission.
- The schedules for fitness test/ sports trials and for trials/ auditions for cultural societies are notified well in advance, on the college website and its notice boards, while selections are done by statutory committees that consist of both college faculty members, university representatives, as well as eminent experts/sportspersons.
   Videography of written test and photography of physical fitness tests are made of sports trial and fitness tests more authentic.
- The entire **admission process** is **computerized**.
- Information regarding admission is compiled and sent to the university on a regular basis.
- Admissions under the Scheduled Castes, Scheduled Tribes, Other Backward Castes, Persons with Disabilities categories, Foreign students, wards of defense personnel injured/killed in war and adjoining boarder area, single girl child, transgender are done on the basis of separate eligibility criteria within the framework of the university guidelines on admissions.
- This admission process is **reviewed by IQAC periodically** in order to make it more effective and convenient for the applicants. The institution is committed to cater to the needs of all sections of the society and exhibit overall inclusiveness. Special care is taken for differently- abled and visually impaired students as JAWS talking software has been installed and Braille sheet are distributed free of cost.
- The seats that are vacant at the end of the admission process are filled on the basis of the criteria determined by the University that are widely notified on both the college website and its notice boards.
- 2.1.2 Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission (Ex. (i) merit (ii) common admission test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (iii) combination of merit and entrance test or merit, entrance test and interview (iv) any other) to various programmes of the Institution.

- Admissions are done within the structure of rules, regulations and procedures stipulated by the Panjab University.
- Students are admitted on the basis of merit and through proper counseling system as per the guidelines issued by the Panjab University.
- In some departments like **B.P.Ed**, **M.P.Ed**, **M.A English and M.Sc. Chemistry** entrance test and interviews are conducted to admit eligible and deserving students into the college.
- In B.Com, BBA, BCA, B.Sc., and Computer Science I classes there is the process of centralized admission.
- The students **apply online free of cost**. They are required to submit a hard copy for counseling.
- Wide ranges of courses are available in Humanities, science, commerce, I.T., and computer. **Honours programmes** are there in most of the disciplines.
- In B.A. 1<sup>st</sup> year 176 subject combinations are offered to the students.
- In science there are 9 subject combinations.
- Specialized courses in Biotechnology, Bioinformatics, Microbiology, Information Technology and Physical Education are also there in the college.

## 2.1.3 Give the minimum and maximum percentage of marks for admission at entry level for each of the programmes offered by the college and provide a comparison with other colleges of the affiliating university within the city/district.

- The college always tries to maintain its standard and integrity in the arena of admission at entry level to different programmes. It always tries to maintain a sense of dignity, integrity and impartiality. For different programmes, different cutoff percentages were applied. In comparison to other colleges, our college admission percentage is very high.
- The following tables show the **minimum and maximum percentage of marks** for admission to both UG and PG classes at the entry level.

## 2.1.4 Is there a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and student profiles annually? If 'yes', what is the outcome of such an effort and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

The college has adopted its own mechanism to properly review the admission process and student profile annually.

- The college has constituted an **admission committee** under a senior faculty Member i.e. **Dean /Vice Principal** to monitor the entire admission process.
- Different committees are formed consisting of the staff members under the **supervision of IQAC** for smooth running and management of the admission process.
- **Online application process** makes the admission system very systematic and helps the students to save time, money and inconveniences.
- As admission is conducted on the basis of merit and proper counseling system meritorious, industrious and well deserving students take admission.
- Under the supervision of the admission committee, proper discipline is maintained and unwanted elements are debarred from taking admission. As a result a healthy atmosphere is created in the college which helps greatly in proper management and administration of the institution.
- Admission Grievance cell, special categories counseling cell and IQAC continuously monitor the admission process.
- The college maintains an environment that ensures that every student, irrespective of his/her community, religion and domicile, is made to feel comfortable.
- Due to continuous monitoring, well maintained discipline, and consistently good exam results, the **intake capacity** of the college is **increasing** every year.

- 2.1.5 Reflecting on the strategies adopted to increase/improve access for following categories of students, enumerate on how the admission policy of the institution and its student profiles demonstrate/reflect the National commitment to diversity and inclusion
  - \* SC/ST, OBC, Women, Differently-abled, economically weaker sections, Minority community.

Adequate provisions and strategies are adopted by the college to increase/improve access for SC, ST, OBC, girls, differently-abled, minority community students' etc. Gender equity and admission opportunity for differently-abled students are also given emphasis. During the current session, i.e. 2016-17 the college has become co-educational institution.

The student community is from different geographical areas and belongs to different socio-economic, cultural and educational backgrounds. The college ensures equality for all eligible candidates.

- SC/ST and OBC: As per the existing government rules, reservations in specified ratios are provided to the SC, ST and Other Backward Community (OBC) students. They also avail many scholarships and benefits like fee waiver and concession etc. College library has book bank facility for such students. They are also getting financial assistance for purchasing books and stationery.
- Women: Reservation of 2 additional seats to "Single Girl Child" is also followed in the admission process.
- **Differently-abled**: As per norms, reservations and other facilities are provided to the **physically challenged students (UT-3% and General 3%).**
- Defence Personnel:- 5% of UT Pool only.
- Wards of Freedom Fighters: 2% of UT and 2% of General pool.
- **Economically weaker Sections**: Students from economically weaker sections get benefits of fee concession and scholarship on production of valid documents from concerned authorities.
- Minority Community: The College ensures full adherence to government policies regarding providing weightage to the wards of cancer and AIDS patients, Kashmiri Displaced persons, Descendants of Kargil Martyrs, 2% to C, 1% to B NCC Certificate holders and 1% to NSS certificate holders.
- **Sports Personnel**: Due importance was given to the students with excellent sports record. **2% of UT and 2% of General pool seats** are reserved for sport persons. The college boasts of a large sports ground with cinder track and a sports pavilion. There is also a swimming pool, a gymnasium, tennis, golf course and a basketball court.

In the current session i.e. 2016-17 the numbers of students increased significantly which indicate the growing popularity and prospective aspect of the college. The reasons are as follows; (1) college has become **co-educational institution**, (2) **seats** have **increased** at the entry level, (3) the college has now a **hostel for girl students**, (4) infrastructure facility has developed after the addition of **Bio Technology Block**, (5) Two **Mega Job Fests** were organized which are reflective of college's focus on student placements, (6) **promotion of academic** and interactive culture, (7) college examination result is much higher than pass % of the Panajb university and (8) college has **well qualified**, hard working, sincere and dedicated **faculty members** which attracted the attention of the students as well as the parents, (9) the college being a Government institution provided numerous facilities to the students, (10) the **admission fees** of the college is less than the private colleges and (11) it provides numerous facilities such as **prospectus at free of cost, fee concession, free ships, scholarships** and other benefits and privileges.

#### 2.2 CATERING TO STUDENT DIVERSITY

### 2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently- abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

- The College strictly adheres to the policies and initiatives taken by the government, the UGC and the Panjab University, Chandigarh towards differently –abled students. It actively promotes the interests and welfare of these students with special needs/ demands by ensuring a physical and academic environment that enables them to access equally all the facilities provided by the college, and to avail of all the choices and opportunities that the institution offers.
- Special care has been taken for differently-abled and visually impaired students. The JAWS –a talking software has been installed in the college while Braille sheets are distributed free of cost. Despite the heritage nature of the college main building, the proposal for the construction of a ramp in the same for differently-abled students is in the process. However, a well maintained ramp is already there in the newly constructed Bio Technology Block of the college.
- 3% seats are reserved for differently-abled and visually impaired students.
- Providing fee concession and scholarship.

- Special provisions are made for conduct of their classes at the ground floor.
- Conduct of examination for such candidates at the ground floor.
- Permission of having a writer during the examination as per the prescribed norms.
- Wash rooms for differently-abled students.
- Audios of English text books are prepared for the visually challenged students.
- The differently-abled students are looked after by a teacher in charge.
- Students from different states of India, particularly from Chandigarh, Punjab, Haryana, Himachal Pradesh, Rajasthan, Delhi, Leh, Ladakh, Uttar Pradesh and Manipur take admission in different courses.
- Students take admission in different courses from different countries like Afghanistan, Nepal, Tibet, Kenya, Iran, and Bhutan.
- An instrument scanner-cum-reader designed by CSIO was tested on students and is very soon being provided in library for their use.

### 2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

Yes, the college assessed the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skill before the commencement of the programme.

- Before admission the students are counselled properly and according to their aptitude and interest they are assigned the programmes like, Science, Arts, commerce, BBA, BCA courses etc.
- University prescribed guidelines is followed to assess students' skill and knowledge. At the onset of the academic session special orientation programmes were organized to acquaint the students with the college and its working system.
- Some departments like English, M.Sc Chemistry and Physical Education have conducted entrance examinations and admitted the meritorious students who qualified the entrance test.
- Orientation programmes are organized before the commencement of classes to acclimatize the new entrants to different aspects of the college.

## 2.2.3 What are the strategies drawn and deployed by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice? (Bridge/Remedial/Add-on/Enrichment Courses, etc.

- Tutorial classes, remedial classes are undertaken to bridge the gap between intelligent and weak students.
- Class test, conduct of seminars, assignments, expert lectures are adopted to bridge the knowledge gap and sensitize the students about their rights and duties.
- Imparts value based quality education and emphasize on holistic development of personality of the students.
- Two Mega job fests were organized to provide job opportunity to the students.
- The career counseling and Placement Cell helps students in campus placements.
- Conduct of personality development classes on regular basis and regular placement drives helps the students immensely.

- Throughout the year counseling facilities in the Psychology Department is available for the students.
- The College has a student support Cell to help and guide the students from time to time.

### 2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

- The college always sensitizes its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.
- The gender equity society of the college organizes orientation programmes for students to sensitize them against gender discrimination. It also organized extensive lectures on gender issues to sensitize the students.
- Anti Sexual Harassment Committee is also there to deal with the grievances related to such cases.
- The staff and students are active participants to the issues related to gender and environment.
- Environment Education is a compulsory subject in First Year at Under Graduate Level.
- Environment Society of the college organizes tree plantation camps, poster making and slogan writing contests related to the environmental issues.
- The Environmental society under the supervision of Professor Sneh Sharma planted medicinal and other trees throughout the college.
- The Departments like Botany, English and NSS volunteers also planted plants at various places in the college.
- The English department has maintained a garden named **Green Spaces** where the students of the department have planted 200 plants.
- College campus has a number of gardens such as Botanical garden, spice garden, sculptural park etc.
- Proper attention has been given to take care of the students from minority communities, girls and SC and ST students.
- In the college campus there is a well furnished and properly maintained **hostel for girl** students.
- The college has a dedicated **Women Cell** and a cell for the Girls students namely CINNAMON (for a change) are running in the college to hear and strive to mitigate grievances and problems, if any faced by them.
- The Department of English created a student support cell **Nayee Disha** which provides regular counseling and mentoring to the students.

### 2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

• The institution identifies and responds to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners by the following methods.

- The Department of physical education is running the M. Phil and Ph.D courses. The Department has also has a Research Centre.
- The Department of History has applied for the opening of a Research Centre.
- In the college Library there is a Research corner for faculty members. 11 Faculty members of the college are supervising 30 Ph.D scholars.
- The college has a well stocked library and has subscribed to numerous printed and online journals to update.
- For students, from time to time the college is organizing/ arranging seminars, workshops, extension lecturers etc.
- Supervise their participation in co-curricular and extracurricular activities.
- Monitor students' attendance, punctuality and discipline.
- The meritorious students are duly rewarded with prizes and certificates.
- The college is also providing job opportunities to the talented and deserving candidates by organizing job fests. During the last one year the college has organized two mega job fests.
- 2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc.)?
  - The college collects, analyzes and uses the data and information on academic performance of the students in an efficient manner during the programme duration.
  - Main data is the examination result on the basis of which reforms and changes are undertaken.
  - From daily attendance their sincerity and devotion towards study is calculated.
  - For students belonging to disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, economically weaker sections etc college provided different incentives in shape of scholarship, fee concession, special provision for reading, particularly for the blind students etc in the college.
  - For slow learners there is the provision for extra and remedial class system.
  - Time to time parent –Teacher meetings are organized to monitor the students' attendance and other issues.
  - Free books are provided to the needy and meritorious students,

### 2.3 TEACHING-LEARNING PROCESS

### 2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)

- The college has planned and organized the teaching, learning and evaluation as per UGC and Panjab University rules and norms.
- The college is following the academic calendar, teaching plan and evaluation process fixed and designed by the Panjab University from time to time.
- It outlines the session schedule, examination schedule, and schedule of vacations.

- In the beginning of the academic year, college prepares its own Annual Planner, planning the probable dates of different activities like cultural activities, sports, NSS, NCC, etc.
- The blue print for the evaluation of students is provided by the university to conduct the semester, supplementary exams, marking, reevaluation during the session.
- The evaluation methods for house examination, unit tests, snap tests, assignments are informed to the student in advance.
- Periodically students are giving presentation in their classes.
- Group discussions are organised to evaluate and assess the potential of the students.
- Assessment marks are awarded to the students on the basis of performance in the examination, attendance in the class and overall conduct.

### 2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching –learning process?

- The IQAC is substantially contributing to the teaching and learning processes in the college. It has a major role in the documentation of the various programmes/activities, which are leading to quantitative as well as qualitative improvements.
- Various academic activities are organized in the institution for effective and up-todate execution of curriculum and evaluation processes.
- The faculty members are guided to procure financial aid for institutional projects from different sponsoring institutions.
- It also generates concepts of academic excellence and strives towards developing student-centric education.
- It undertook quality initiatives and strives for the enhancement of the academic activities of the college.
- It communicates all information regarding various schemes/projects of Chandigarh Administration and other institutions like UGC, ICSSR, ICHR, ISRO, CSIO, DST, IMTEC and CSIR and different companies to the faculty members & students from time to time. It especially promotes quality education.

## 2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

- The college always gives emphasis on student centric learning. The syllabus and mode of instructions is also student centric.
- Adopted new ways of learning and emphasized on individualistic and personalized approach.
- Followed interactive learning process. The teachers taught in the class room through chalk and talk (black board), PPT, analyses the points, put questions and give assignments to the students. They felicitated students in various activities and gives importance on case study and inductive reasoning.
- Time to time organizing seminars, discussions and periodical examinations.
- Teachers are providing a variety of learning experiences, including individual and collaborative learning.
- The teachers are also applying interactive and participatory approach to creating a

feeling of responsibility in learning and to make learning a process of construction of knowledge.

- Study tours, academic tours are organized from time to time to inspire and rejuvenate the students. The students of Professional Studies (IT), History, and others visited different places of Himachal Pradesh through study tour.
- The students of the History Department in August 2016 visited portrait gallery and in September 2016 visited museum.
- Students of Zoology Department visited Sukhna Lake and museum.
- The students of the Bio Technology Department have visited ISSER, NIPER and Central Instrumental Lab.
- College library both book and magazine section provided ample opportunity to the students for their independent as well as collaborative learning.
- Wi-Fi internet facility in the college campus, medical care and other modern amenities including the hostels both boys and girls inside the campus make education more student centric.
- Feedback by students is another feature which makes students learing student centric.

### 2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

- Through the organization of science exhibition, publication of newsletters and wall magazines critical thinking, creativity, and scientific temper is nurtured among the students.
- Field trips and study tours are arranged to different places.
- Faculty encourages and develops creativity among the students through the activities of different societies.
- The curriculum and the examination pattern are designed in such a way that the students are compelled to imbibe critical thinking.
- The college organized different competitions like essay writing contest, debate, declamation contest, slogan writing contests, quiz, poem writing, poetry recitation and story writing competitions etc which inspire and encourage students creativity.
- In the month of October 2016, from 5<sup>th</sup> to 8<sup>th</sup> the college organized the Zonal Youth and Heritage Festival which provided ample opportunity to be creative and innovative.
- Different departments organized departmental fests to felicitate the students.
- Bio-Technology Department regularly taking their students to visit NIPER, ISSER and Central Instrumental Lab.
- The students of Geography Department are regularly visiting Meteorological Department and Survey of India.
- The Department of History organized study tour to various places of Himachal Pradesh and Portraits gallery and Museum at Chandigarh.
- The college organized two Mega Job fests inviting different companies where students/ candidates from different parts of North India such as Jammu and Kashmir, U.P, Delhi, Punajab, Haryana, Rajasthan participated. In February 2016,

709 candidates and in September 2016, 890 candidates got job opportunities.

2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? E.g.: Virtual laboratories, e-learning - resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

The technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty in the institution for effective teaching are as follows:

- A virtual laboratory to demonstrate animal dissection is being maintained by the zoology department.
- The department of zoology has two **smart laboratories**.
- An **e-library** which includes different topics of syllabus is also maintained by the department.
- Teaching through Power-point presentations: The College has **23 smart room classes** and teachers are imparting learning through PPT.
- E-learning: Resources are used from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL).
- Online Library System: Thousand of online journals have been subscribed which helped the faculty members to update their knowledge.
- Online Project Submission: The faculty members are running different projects sponsored by different national bodies like UGC, ICHR, ICSSR, ISRO, INSA etc.
- Teaching is being imparted through **Audio Visual Aids**.
- The college is equipped with latest technologies such as **internet labs**, Wi-Fi facility, e-surveillance etc.
- All the departments are provided with desktops with **internet facilities**, **laptops**, **printers**, **and projectors** etc. for effective teaching and learning.
- 56 laptops are provided to the Departments and Faculty members.
- Faculty members have uploaded e-content in the college website for the students.
- Laboratories of different departments like Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology, Biotechnology, IT, Psychology, Geography etc are well maintained.
- The library has subscribed to more than **6000 e-journals** which are open to its faculty and students.
- Almost every student is having smart phone through which they are browsing data and downloading study materials

### **2.3.6** How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?

- The Department of Functional English is providing blended learning through its lab, curriculum and media related activities.
- The college in the sessions 2015-16 and 2016-17 organized seminars, , workshops, extension lectures/ expert lecturers etc, and by participating in the same both the

students and faculty members learn a lot and enrich their academic activities.

- Students participated in different activities like quiz, declamation, essay writing competitions, creative writing competition etc not only in Chandigarh but also in different parts of Punjab and Haryana.
- Expert and guest lecturers delivered by eminent academicians are arranged to expose faculty and students to advance knowledge of knowledge and skills.
- Faculty members participated in seminars, conferences, symposiums, workshops etc organized by various universities and institutions.
- Few faculty members had gone abroad to participate in seminars.
- In Department of Physical Education-Teacher Education, Learning and Research there is a Research Centre (TEL&R) and the History Department has applied for opening of a Research Centre.
- The college from 5<sup>th</sup> to 8<sup>th</sup> October 2016 organized the Zonal Youth and Heritage Festival of the Panjab University which exposed the students to advanced knowledge in the field of music, dance, drama, quiz and other literary activities.

#### 2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students \benefitted) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counseling/mentoring/academic advise) provided to students?

- Maximum numbers of students' have benefitted from the professional counseling, mentoring and academic advice provided to them by the college.
- Counseller of the college Mr. Raj Lamba guides the students regarding coping with stress related to their studies, socio-psychological aspects.
- Counseling is also given by the staff members to slow learners to come up in academics at par with other students.
- Anti Ragging Cell and Anti Sexual Harassment committee is always alert and active to provide instant help to the aggrieved students.

- Three of our faculty members from the department of Mathematics Dr. Baljeet Singh, from Zoology Dr. Jagdish Kaur and from commerce department Dr. Monika Aggrawal are awarded with research projects from UGC, New Delhi.
- The outcome of these projects would hereby enrich the academic content and the subject information disseminated to the students. This mode of learning and teaching benefit teacher and taught alike.
- Teaching through Audio Visual Aids.
- Conduct of seminars, conferences and symposiums.
- Initiatives for implementation of innovative methods under RUSA programme.

#### 2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

- College has a well equipped and well stocked library.
- Library is completely online. Teachers and students can search and locate any book through internet.
- In the library there are **1,12,699 books** (including 200 rare books), **70 periodicals**, **15 journals**, **17 News papers** ( 8 double copies), **325 CDs** and cassettes, more than **6000 e-journals** and **30,00,000 e-books through INFLIBNET**.
- Library has subscribed to a number of reputed journals and magazines to update the knowledge of the students as well as the teachers.
- College library is fully computerized with online access and a new feature of transaction messaging through SMS and email.
- Latest publications are finding their place in the college library within a week.
- Library has a Braille Corner for visually challenged students.
- Library committee gives recommendation to purchase Books and Journals as per the requirement of the students and scholars.
- Library pioneered in uploading Old question papers of both U.G and P.G of Punjab University in college website.
- Pending degrees since 1958 are available online.
- Library is open from 8.30 to 5.00 PM for the readers.
- In the library a separate Research Cell has been established.
- The library emails **daily news clippings** related to college and Panjab university activities through e-mail to its all faculty members
- All these helped tremendously in augmenting the teaching and learning process.

- In all the semesters the college pass % is much higher than the university pass %.

- College has 61 regular and 62 contractual highly qualified faculty members.

- College has no independent authority to recruit the faculty members. However, 62 faculty members are serving on contract basis who are recruited through a process of interview by a duly constituted body and 81 Resource Persons are engaged by the concerned departments.
- The faculty members are taken initiative to learn and keep abreast of the latest developments, to innovate, continuously seek improvement in their work and strive for individual and institutional excellence.

  - Subjects like Biotechnology, Bioinformatics and Information Technology, are very much in demand by the students.
  - There are 10 well qualified teachers in the Department of Bio-Technology who are

well versed with advanced learning in the subject.

• There are separate blocks for these departments with well equipped laboratories and infrastructure.,

- College provides various facilities for staff development programmes.

- The English Department conducted UGC-NET coaching classes, extension lecturers and remedial classes during 2015-17 sponsored by RUSA.
- It devised innovative strategies as per the guidelines of the UGC as well as the University to enhance the quality among the teachers.
- It encouraged its faculty members to participate in different national and international seminars, workshops, symposia's etc.
- Granted permission and leave as per rule to its faculty members to attend short term courses, seminars, conferences, workshops etc. to enrich their knowledge with new developments in their concerned fields and subjects.
- College has also organized faculty development programme in September 2016 sponsored by the department of science and technology, Govt. of India.

- The college organized training programmes to empower and enable the faculty members to use various tools and technology in teaching and learning process.
- It organized workshops on faculty development programme sponsored by RUSA as well as by the Department of Science and Technology, Government of India.
- It also organized workshops on Human rights, office management, Research methodology in social sciences and choice Based credit System.
- The college has internal assessment system. For Graduation students there is 10% and for Post Graduation students there is 20% assessment system. Assessment system keeps the students committed, disciplined and sincere towards study as well as towards the institution. It also helps the students to score high marks. It also enhances student-teacher relationship and hence, helped the teaching-learning process.
- The maximum teaching is imparted in the college through PPT. The college has 23 smart rooms. Smart room classes helped the students enormously. They can visualize the things and can grasp and understand the subject quickly. The college has also audio-visual provisions which are utilized in the process of teaching and learning.
- The college has well furnished computerized laboratories for IT, BCA, BBA and Computer Science students. Free computer lab facilities are adequately provided to the students for updating their knowledge and study.
- The college has modernized and well furnished science laboratories. The faculty members also prepared study materials for the students by which the students are greatly benefited.

  - The college has highly qualified faculty who are the main assets of the college. For their knowledge, eruditeness and intelligence they have very often been invited by different organizations and institutions as resource persons.
  - Some of the faculty members are invited to participate as resource persons in workshops, seminars and conferences.
  - Almost 100% of our faculty members have participated and presented research papers in various seminars and conferences, both national and international organized by different organizations.

  - To recharge and inspire teachers many options are there. Leaves and initiatives are provided to them to rejuvenate them in teaching and research activities. Some of them are getting research grants from UGC and other academic bodies.
  - The institution has encouraged the teachers to engage in research activities like doing

Ph.D and D.Litt. to enhance the teaching quality.

- Seminars, workshops and conferences are organized in the college for this purpose.
- The faculty members have attended and presented papers in various international seminars and conferences.
- In 2015-17 the college has organized 12 workshops and Faculty Development Programmes sponsored by RUSA and Department of Science and Technology, Government of India for the academic enrichment of the faculty members.
- About 30 extension lectures were organized by various departments for the academic development of the faculty members.
- The faculty members are encouraged to publish research papers and books. Some of our faculty members have published books from reputed publishers.
- Dr. Benudhar Patra, Associate Professor in history has published 2 of his six books in the last year.
- Dr. Anuradha Bhattacharya, Assistant Professor in English has published 5 books (2 novels, 1 poetry and 2 Academic Books) in 2015 and 2016.

2.4.6 Has the institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external Peers? If yes, how is the evaluation used for improving the quality of the teaching-learning process?

- The college has the system of evaluation of teachers by students through **feedback system.** Every year from time to time feedback proformas are provided to the students to fill up without any fear and partiality.
- They are free to write their views in the feedback proformas. Later on, the proformas are analyzed revealing the comments of the students which helped to improve the teaching-learning process and to rectify the mistakes if any committed by the faculty members.

### 2.5 EVALUATION PROCESS AND REFORMS

### 2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

- The students and faculty members of our college are quite aware of the evaluation process. The assessment of teaching and learning helps to increase the efficiency and effectiveness of the system.
- Evaluation system helps the teachers to plan appropriate activities for enhancing student performance. The evaluation system is also very much useful for enhancing the competence of students.
- The qualitative dimension of innovative evaluation process is to gauge the knowledge and skills acquired at various levels of the programmes and our college is following the same with the same purpose.
- Through notification and instructions issued by the college regarding the conduct of class tests, mid semester and semester examinations, seminar presentations, group discussions the students become aware of the evaluation process.

### 2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

- The institution has adopted all the evaluation reforms adopted by the Panjab University.
- To evaluate teachers we have adopted student feedback system.
- Students are evaluated through the process of class examinations, assessment, seminars and other activities.
- Spot and time bound evaluation of answer sheets.
- Quick and date bound publication of results.
- Confidential assignment of codes to each answer sheet.
- Online submission of practical and assessment marks.

### 2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

- Our college effectively implements the evaluation reforms adopted by the Panjab University.
- In addition to university evaluation system, the college has also adopted its own criteria in the process of evaluation by implementing the methods like conducting

examinations from time to time, strictly observing the attendance system, evaluation of teachers by students through the feedback system etc.

- The Panjab University has adopted spot evaluation which is very systematic and ahead of hundreds of universities of India.
- Computerized practical marks and assessment marks are sent to the Panjab university online.

- To measure the achievements of the students, the college as per the university system has adopted both formative and summative evaluation processes.
- The college is having semester system. As per this system the students have to appear first the formative test (mid semester) and after completing that they have to appear the summative test (semester) which is very helpful to the students for their preparation and scoring of marks.
- The performance of the students is much better in semester system than the annual examination system.
- Throughout the session the students are involved in attending classes.
- In semester system the dropout number is less.
- Syllabus burden is lessened in the semester system. As a result syllabus is completed in time.
- 2.5.5 Enumerate on how the institution monitors and communicates the progress and performance of students through the duration of the course/programme? Provide an analysis of the students results/achievements (Programme/course wise in last years) and explain the differences if any and patterns of achievement across the programmes/courses offered.
  - The institution very efficiently monitors and communicates the progress and performance of students throughout the duration of the course/programme.
  - The college is observing mainly three things of the students, i.e. attendance, performance in the examination and conduct/character. Students are strictly monitored on these parameters.
  - If they remain absent in the class or not attend classes continuously for 10 days their names are struck off from the registrar; secondly if he or she has not scored the minimum percentage of marks in the house test he or she may not be allowed to sit in the final examination, and thirdly if a student does not behave properly or misbehaves or creates any type of nuisance he or she will be expelled from the college.
  - A student whose name is struck off can be permitted for readmission only once.
  - From time to time, the college also conducts Parent-Teacher meetings to keep in touch with parents and to exercise control over the students.
  - Tutorial classes are taken every week on Wednesday where they are apprised of their duties and responsibilities in the college.

- 2.5.6 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last two years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.
  - The college has made significant improvements in ensuring transparency in the internal assessment during the last year.
  - While giving assessment marks, attendance, curricular activities and % marks in the mid semester are taken into consideration.
  - Internal Assessment marks are **displayed on the notice board** which makes the internal assessment system very transparent.
  - While Internal Assessment Marks are assigned the aspects such as conduct and behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skill, scoring of marks in the house test, co- curricular activities, participation in seminars and discussions etc. are taken into consideration.

## 2.5.7 Does the institution and individual teachers use assessment/evaluation as an indicator for evaluating student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning? If 'yes' provide details on the process and cite a few examples.

- Yes, both the institution and individual teachers consider assessment/evaluation as an indicator for evaluating student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning.
- As assessment is based on students' behavioral aspects, attendance, independent learning, communication skill, scoring of marks in the house test etc. consideration of assessment/evaluations as an indicator for evaluating student performance is logical.
- Quiz, class presentations, writing term papers, seminars, PPT, surprise tests, snap tests, conduct of practicals, assignments are other methods of evaluation of students.

### 2.5.8 What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the college and University level?

- The college has adopted different mechanisms to redress grievances related to evaluation both at college and university level.
- In the university examination, if a student does not get the expected marks he or she can apply for revaluation of his or her answer sheet, even if he is not satisfied with the revaluation he can apply for valuation by the third examiner. So, there is a transparency and sincerity in the evaluation process.
- Even in the Panjab university examination the students can get the photo copies of the answer sheets on demand through RTI.

#### • Adequate infrastructure and human resources

The College Library has adequate number of printed books, E- books and journals for the researchers. A separate cell has already been established in the library with adequate infrastructure for researchers. The science labs have adequate infrastructure and instruments required for research.

### • Time-off, reduced teaching load, special leave etc. to teachers

Those teachers who wish to attend seminars/conferences/workshops/ Refresher Course/Orientation Courses are given duty leave for this purpose. However, there is no provision for reduced teaching load. Special leave for researchers working on projects is granted as per rules.

Mr. Mohan Lal Sharma, Assistant Prof. in the Department of Commerce, has availed study leave under UGC scheme.

There is no separate provision of ear-marking budgetary provision for research. However, the financial allocation to meet the expenditure related to research is from Research Fund of the Research Centre in the Department of Department Physical Education - Teacher Education, Learning and Research . The fund utilized for research is approximately Rs. 1512075/-.

Although there is no monetary support; the students are provided with various facilities for research projects and it includes availability of computer labs equipped with internet facility, printers, scanners, and photocopy machine. The biggest support is the wholehearted encouragement given by faculty members as they play the role of mentors, thus nurturing amongst the young inquisitive minds a spirit of scientific inquiry.

## **3.2.4** How does the various departments/units/staff of the institute interact in undertaking inter-disciplinary research? Cite examples of successful endeavors and challenges faced in organizing interdisciplinary research.

The departments of Zoology, Biotechnology and Botany often collaborate with each other in organizing lectures, workshops etc. which are essentially transdisciplinary in nature.

Expert lectures organized by any one department from the faculty of social sciences are attended by members from other departments also. Lectures organized by one language department are attended by members from other language departments too. There is no doubt that disciplinary boundaries are melting giving rise to interdisciplinary research. There is provision for Inter Disciplinary Research Programme in the Department of Department Physical Education - Teacher Education, Learning and Research . The research scholars outside the campus are allowed to conduct the research in the college campus, use of library and also issue of lab gadgets as per the availability and requirement of the scholars.

#### 4.4 Maintenance of Campus Facilities

4.4.1 How does the institution ensure optimal allocation and utilization of the available financial resources for maintenance and upkeep of the following facilities (substantiate your statements by providing details of budget allocated during last four years)?

- Internal Quality Assurance Committee (IQAC) along with College Infrastructure Development Committee (CIDC) regularly monitors and evaluates the infrastructure to ensure its timely upgradation.
- The maintenance of college building and furniture is done by Maintenance Department UT Chandigarh. Proposals are sent to Director Higher Education for approval and allocation of budget. The utilization of the same is done by Maintenance Department for maintaining the building and repairing the furniture.
- New furniture/ Items are purchased by college purchase committee (upto 1 Lakh) with the approval of D.H.E. For Items costing more than 1 Lakh, purchase is through Central Purchase Committee of Chandigarh Administration. For more than 2 Lakhs, e-tendering procedure is followed.
- Equipments for laboratories are purchased every year out of Plan / Non plan/ funds.
- Inverters, UPS and one generator are also available.

### 4.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure, facilities and equipment of the college?

- There are water coolers with purifiers, water dispensers, EPABX system, Fire Extinguishers, ACs, Computers, Printers and Photostat machines. Caretaker takes care of their maintenance.
- For the upkeep of green areas college has deployed 30 gardeners.
- For maintaining cleanliness and sanitation, 22 sweepers are deployed.

### **4.4.3** How and with what frequency does the institute take up calibration and other precision measures for the equipment/instruments?

• The equipments and instruments as and when required are repaired/maintained with the departmental funds.

### 4.4.4 What are the major steps taken for location, upkeep and maintenance of sensitive equipment (voltage fluctuations, constant supply of water etc.)?

- The college gets direct water supply from the Municipal Corporation. Boosters are installed to have proper supply of water in the campus. Water purifiers (AMC done) are checked frequently to ensure safe drinking water.
- All electrical equipments are controlled and supplied through an 11 KV Sub-station located within the campus and monitored by the Engineering Department of the Chandigarh Administration.
- Routine electrical maintenance is done by Engineering Department of Chandigarh Administration.
- A Solar Power Plant provided by the CRST Department under the aegis of Department of Science & Technology of Chandigarh, with a capacity for generating 435 kilowatts has been set up in the campus, of which 40 kilowatts is being given to the General Hostel, Sector 15, and 395 kilowatts within the campus.

#### • NOTE – College building enjoys heritage status given by Chandigarh Administration, utmost care is taken to preserve its heritage character.

Yes, every year updated prospectus is issued by the college to start the admission process, In the session 2016-17 joint online prospectus (for all Govt. Colleges of Chandigarh) was prepared and uploaded on website www.dhechd.org by our college and it is available free of cost. The prospectus carries detailed information regarding courses offered, number of seats in each course, admission schedule, admission procedure, course wise fee structure, examination system, extra-curricular activities, college rules and other facilities provided by the college. The prospectus also provides detailed information about the faculty available in the college. For the students requiring hostel accommodation in the college, a separate hand book of hostel rules is provided by the college. In addition to this help desk service is provided to the new entrants and parents.

✓ Keeping in mind the health and hygiene of the college students, clean drinking water facility is available in the college. Health Centre in the college provides medical facility and medicines to the students free of cost. The Health Centre has a full time Physiotherapist, Pharmacist and Attendant/Dresser.

- ✓ Organizing coaching classes for Competitive Exams
  - Coaching classes are arranged for competitive/UGC/ NET examinations free of cost. Presently 90 students are getting training for competitive examinations in the college.
- ✓ Skill development (spoken english, computer literacy, etc.,)
  - The college regularly conducts Personality Development Programmes for students of outgoing classes. This is done in collaboration with RIE (Regional Institute for English Sector 32, Chandigarh). This 100 hour course is aimed at honing the English speaking and writing skills to enhance the employability skill of the students. During the session 2015-16 about 800 students and in session 2016-17, 857 students were enrolled for the PDP classes.
  - To enhance the employability skills among the students, two training programmes of 45 Hours each related to computer literacy were arranged with collaboration of SKD Learning Private Ltd., Sector-32 D, Chandigarh, in which 90 students participated and were successfully trained.
  - 40 students are getting training in the college to enhance their employability quotient in I.T. sector with collaboration of Telcocrats Technologies Private Ltd., Phase-8, Industrial Area, Mohali.
  - 90 students are getting coaching in the college to enhance the employability skill in banking sector (POs) and other competitive examinations with the collaboration of CL Educate Ltd., Sector 35C, Chandigarh.
  - An eight day Personality Development & Leadership Training camp for NCC cadets from Punjab, Haryana, Himachal and U.T. Chandigarh was organized by the college in collaboration with NCC Directorate for preparing the students for interview of Subordinate Services Board and to enter Armed Force services as Commission Officers.
  - For providing coaching for competitive examinations and enhancing the skill in spoken English and computer literacy, 11 MOUs are signed by the college with various institutions and organizations.

- 2<sup>nd</sup> Job Fest- 38 Companies from various sectors like IT, Banks, Insurance Companies, Retail. Telecom, Education, Web Designing and financial services visited the college campus and 890 students were shortlisted.

- •College library uploaded the digitized previous years question papers of P.U. annual examinations since 2014 with access to 192 affiliated colleges of Panjab University.
- •Student clearing more than 50% of the total papers in a year is promoted to the next class and is also allowed to re-appear in the examination.
- Students who represent college in inter college/university competition are allowed to appear in special tests and are also given concession in attendance so that their internal assessment is well taken care of.
- The students who, for one reason or the other, fail to appear in the schedule mid semester House Examinations are provided another chance to fulfill their condition by conducting special examinations.
- The CSIO (Central Scientific Instrument Origination) has agreed to adopt the college for creative learning pedagogy and to support training and development programme of the faculty. This will open doors of CSIO laboratories for visits and interaction of faculty and students for various activities.

•Diet to the students participating in extracurricular and co-curricular activities is funded by the institution as per the norms laid down by the State Govt./ Panjab University from time to time. The present rate of diet for sports activities is Rs. 35 per participant per day for in-campus and Rs. 80 per participant per day for out-campus activities. For the preparation of items in Youth Festival and other cultural activities, the refreshment is served to the students @ Rs.60 per student per day.

- "SWACHH BHARAT ABHIYAAN" has been started in the college with the active participation of staff and students. A rally was organized by the NCC cadets of the college under "SWACHH BHARAT ABHIYAAN"
- Departments and Societies of the college organize various competitions in which the students showcase their creativity and skills in various events viz. debates, quizzes, declamation, poster- making, rangoli, slogan-writing, skits etc.
- Students are also encouraged to participate in inter-college competitions and in P.U. Chandigarh Zonal Youth & Heritage Festival. This year, college organized P.U. Chandigarh Zonal Youth & Heritage Festival 2016 from 5<sup>th</sup> October to 8<sup>th</sup> October 2016 in which 13 colleges of the city participated. Our college participated in 57 events and won 8 first prizes, 4 second prizes and 9 third prizes. One student of our college won first prize and two other students won third prize in P.U. Inter Zonal Youth Festival 2016 held at Ludhiana. Harsimran Singh participated in National Youth Festival held at Rohtak and organized by Ministry of Youth Affairs, Govt. of India.

  - The college magazine "Vikas" is a platform for showcasing literary and creative talents.
  - The magazine is divided into different sections. The students are encouraged to write articles, poems on various issues.

Periodic meetings with Director Higher Education are held by the Principal for various developmental programs for the faculty and the institute. Other than giving the faculty members autonomy at Department level, the Principal ensures and encourages the staff for all round institutional progress. The following

- Alumni Association Alumni Association acts as a strong mode of continuous feedback, placement of students and overall quality improvement in academic and co curricular activities. Regular Alumni Meets is Annual feature of the college activity calendar.
- Societies All the students are distributed in 8 different societies wherein the students under the leadership of teachers work for the betterment of society and environment.
- **Finance Department** The Finance Department takes care of all the financial institutional requirements, release and utilization of funds and keeps a regular check on the income generated and expenditure of the college. The PLA funds are managed and utilized under the supervision of college Bursar.



# 6.2.4 Give a broad description of the quality improvement strategies of the institution for each of the following:

**Teaching & Learning**: All efforts are made to make teaching and learning learnercentered and interactive. Regular chalk and talk methods are supplemented with ICT enabled methodologies and by organizing seminars, guest lectures, group discussions, quiz and assignments, departmental fests, visit to industry and institutes etc. The head of the departments ensure that proper quality is maintained for academic excellence. The review of teaching and learning is monitored by IQAC. Student's feedback, periodic tutorials & Parent Teacher Meetings are undertaken on regular basis.

A well equipped, digitalized library with INFLIBNET data base is available for the optimum use by the students and faculty. The library is digitalizing college magazine 'Vikas' since its inception, previous PU question papers for graduate and post graduate classes since 2014 and data of pending degrees in the college since 1958. This information is available on the college website. E modules covering the curricula topics of all the subjects is available to students globally.

**Research & Development:** Teachers are encouraged to get involved in research work by writing papers, attending seminars/conferences and workshops. There is a Research centre for faculty in the library. College has started 11 online e-journals to promote research..Faculty is given study leave & duty leave when they have to attend/make presentations at seminars/conferences. 11 teachers are guiding 30 Ph.D. and M.Phil. scholars of Panjab University and other universities. Eleven faculty members have completed their Ph.D.in recent years. The college has a highly equipped Research centre in Physical Education Department duly approved by Panjab University. Laptops have been given to faculty members as a research-support mechanism.

**Community Engagement:** The students, through various societies, NCC and NSS, are encouraged to undertake community-oriented activities like social work, health-hygiene awareness, medical camps, adult education and literacy, blood donation, AIDS awareness, environmental awareness etc.

**Human Resource Management:** Technical/ Subject experts are invited to deliver special lectures. The college has signed eleven MOU's with different industries, NGO and bodies. Resource persons are hired to cover the extra workload. Special interactive sessions are arranged for students to sensitize them on socially relevant issues. Anti Ragging helpline, Grievance cell, Anti Sexual Harassment cell, Self Defence Training for girls and hobby classes are some of the initiatives taken up under human resource management.

The office staff is sent on **training** to other institutions for equipping them with the latest office and computer techniques.

A fund named **Humanitarian Guardians** is generated by the college wherein donations are given generously by the college staff. This fund is used for assisting the needy students for payment of fee and purchase of books and stationery.

**Industry Interaction**: Industry interactions are done through our very active placement cell. The institute interacts with various local as well as outside institutes and industrial units. Regular **career counselling & job fests** are held for placement of students in various sectors.

Entrepreneurship development is encouraged by establishing **Entrepreneurial Promotion Cell** in collaboration with the highly prestigious Alumni Association of the College. 11 MOU's have been signed with various bodies, NGOs and institutes.

Communication skills of the students are enhanced through a 100 hour **personality development program** so that the students can face the challenges of employment sector interview and group discussion sessions.

Feedback system exists and teachers obtain feedback from students. Feedback is also received during periodic tutorials. PTMs are held regularly. Coverage by media is also considered. The head of the departments review and make the necessary improvements.

#### **Faculty Empowerment Strategies**

6.3.1 What are the efforts made by the institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non teaching staff?

For supporting and ensuring the professional development of the faculty, the college has the following policies, practices and resources.

The institution encourages the faculty to pursue higher studies like M.Phil, Ph.D & publications of papers and books. A faculty research centre is established in the library for publishing papers and research work. A well equipped, digitalized library with INFLIBNET data base is available for the optimum use by the students and faculty. 11 online journals of different subjects have been started for which ISSN no is applied for. **11 teachers are guiding 30 Ph.D. and M.Phil. Scholars of Panjab University and other universities. Eleven faculty members have completed their Ph.Ds.** recently. Faculty members undergo orientation and refresher courses as per requirement. Faculty is encouraged to organize workshop, seminars, conferences etc. Academic flexibility is extended to faculty who are involved in research. Faculty members are encouraged to deliver lectures in professional institutes as resource persons.

Administrative staff members are encouraged to enhance their professional competence through higher studies and development programmes.

Laptops have been given to teaching staff so that they can pursue academic/research work.

#### **Financial Management and Resource Mobilization**

6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

Available financial resources are effectively managed through a Computerized Accounts Department. The PLA funds are managed and utilized under the supervision of college Bursar. The IQAC along with advisory committee and UGC committee headed by the Principal monitors all the financial resources and dealings. The college follows double entry system for maintaining the accounts which are of following three types:

- Income and Expenditure
- Receipts and Payment Accounts
- Balance Sheets

Accounts department of the college prepares a Budget for every financial year in order to make efficient use of the financial sources. The following three types of payment/expenditure are made –

The salary bills are passed by treasury office, sector 17 Chandigarh.

Research committee of the college regulates utilization of funds received from the funding agencies like UGC, DST, PU, ICSSR etc for minor and major projects.

The college strictly adheres to the rules framed by competent authority of the Chandigarh Administration.

External Audit of Plan and non- plan head was conducted by Accountant General, UT, Chandigarh in the month of July 2016 for the period 1.04.15 to 31.03.2016. Audit of the PLA funds has been done upto March 2014.

The financial requirements of the college are met by the Chandigarh Administration under the budgetary allocations and supplementary grants. The college also gets grants from UGC & RUSA under the general development and various other schemes which are run by the college under the plans.

UGC has allocated Rs. 5.76 lakh towards the first installment of general development grant under 12<sup>th</sup> plan. Rs, 7,50,000/- Grant has been received under RUSA in sessions 2015 – 16 and 2016 – 17.

Approval of PG courses and Honours courses is done by a committee constituted by the Punjab University with a nominee from the DHE.

Our institution is affiliated to the Panjab University Therefore, the external quality assurance agency / regulatory authority is the Panjab University. - ICT classrooms with audio visual aids are extensively used for teaching learning process.
- Student feedback is regularly taken.
- Excursion trips, departmental fests and seminars etc are regularly held.

#### **CRITERIA VII: INNOVATIONS AND BEST PRACTICES**

#### 7.1 Environment Consciousness

Our college is an eco friendly campus. The Principal and the faculty members are committed to provide an eco-friendly ambience in the institution for teaching and learning. To make students aware of the issue eco friendly practices such as Tree plantation drives and cleanliness drives are undertaken on regular basis. An extensive green cover is maintained, energy and water is conserved and parking is quite distant from the main college building serving the same purpose.

#### 7.1.1 Does the Institute conduct a Green Audit of its campus and facilities?

A detailed account of the number of all the trees, plants and gardens is regularly done. The college has been declared a Smoking Free Zone and No Polythene Zone. The college has an Environment Awareness Society which deals specifically with environment related awareness-generation and sensitization activities. The volunteers of NSS units of the college engage in tree plantation, sanitation drives and eco-friendly activities to create awareness amongst the students and society. NASA prescribed 10 indoor plants which purify air are also planted. Efforts are made to have as many species and varieties of plants as possible.

#### 7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus eco-friendly?

- \* Energy conservation
- Majority of lights is converted into LED's as a better alternative
- Solar panels are installed in our campus for energy conservation
- Lights and fans are checked & switched off after college hours
- The electrical wiring in the college has been protected against leakage and short circuit
- The college has an **electricity substation** powered by Punj loyd.
- The college has 4.3 acres of land for **Botanical Garden** which acts as a green cover for carbon neutrality.

The college has **Cosmic Garden, Herbal Garden and a Spice Village** and provision for vermin composting.

#### **Efforts for Carbon Neutrality**

- The college has a provision of solar energy panels to conserve energy and minimize energy consumption. Thus carbon credits are being generated.
- College maintains its green cover to absorb maximum carbon emission.
- Burning of dried leaves is prohibited in the college.
- A CTU bus stop in front of the college gate encourages students to use buses to commute to college. Usage of cycles and car pooling is encouraged.
- For segregating biodegradable and non-biodegradable waste, separate waste bins have been placed at several places in the College
- Online paperless and cashless working
- Reduce noise and air pollution
- Save energy, water and resources by Reuse , Recycle, Reduce
- Save petrol by pollution control and car pooling

• Best out of waste activities are organized regularly.

#### \* Plantation

We have numerous varieties of plants and trees in our college .This not only enhances the beauty of the college but also is beneficial for the environment. Male Sycus heritage plants are planted all around the boundry wall. Regular tree plantation drives by NSS and Environmental Society are undertaken. All important days pertaining to environment are celebrated.

#### \* Water harvesting

The twin practice of **Rain Water Harvesting** and **Drip Irrigation System** is installed for sustainable conservation of water table. Since 2006 the college is equipped with Tertiary waste water management which is used for irrigation of green belt to save ground water. A **check dam** is constructed in the playground of Physical Education Department to control soil erosion, improve water table and control growth of termite.

- \* Nine **water purifiers** with regular AMC are installed in the campus to ensure safe drinking water.
- \* For effective **e-waste management**, there is provision of dumping e-waste material in a separate store which is later on written off as per norms laid by the Chandigarh. Administration.

#### Innovations

- ICT aided teacher student learning through smart class rooms, e-content module, audio visual aids, remedial classes, and periodic tutorials are used extensively. There is a language work station and a RTV studio for improving the communication skills of the students. The project of Language Lab under the aegis of RUSA has been sent for approval.
- In our approach from classroom to community, the **Physiotherapy Lab** caters to the society at large free of cost.
- **Digital information boards** and **Biometric attendance** for staff has been installed and implemented.
- Various academic and 8 **interdisciplinary societies** supplement the teaching/education with community and extension activities so that the objective of institutional social responsibility is achieved.
- The college has started **11 online e journals** in different subjects for which ISSN number is applied for.
- Entrepreneurship development is encouraged by establishing **Entrepreneurial Promotion Cell** in collaboration with the highly prestigious Alumni Association of the College.
- A 100 hour **Personality Development Programme** for final year students is being conducted to train them not only in personality development but also in soft skills, group discussions, public speaking, interviews and presentation skills.
- Special **counter for making Aadhar cards** of the students and staff was set up twice in the college premises and approximately 200 Aadhar cards were made and issued.
- Our college has pioneered in making **passports of students and staff** of the college under the Scheme of 'Ministry of Foreign Affairs" wherein 15 passports have already been received by the students and faculty.

- To increase industry academia interface the college has signed **11 MOU's** with various organizations and industries.
- **CSIO** has adopted our college for scientific excellence and exposure.
- As per directions of Govt. of India for good governance we are **transparent and** accountable to comply with the **Right to Information Act**, 2005.
- **'Humanitarian Guardian Fund**' is generated wherein donations are given generously by the college staff. This fund is used for assisting the needy students for payment of fee and purchase of books and stationery.
- **Faculty research centre** is established in library for research, publications by the faculty. Text books are collected by library to be distributed among the needy students. Students are encouraged to minimize paper wastage and go online.
- **'Open eye foundation'** a club founded by our alumus also collects & provides books to needy students in the college campus. Fees and scholarships are paid by the Alumini for few deserving students.
- **Doctor's Foundation Club** provides medical consultancy & Lab Test Facility free of cost to all students.
- A unique book 'Post Graduate Govt. College sector 11, Chandigarh' 'Past and present' written with contributions from faculty of History and English dept.
- **Electronic Data Processing cell** of the college implements internet connectivity, campus networking, website development and computerization of examination system.
- The "Society for Creating Awareness against Drug Abuse' (SCAADA) works in collaboration with **faculty of psychology department** as well as with the Anti Stress Helpline of the college. SCAADA endeavors to educate its members through activities in college and outreach programmes in neighboring rural areas.
- **Cosmic garden** based on scientific research is established which has been created in the campus to promote holistic health & alternative medicine. A **Herbal Garden** has a variety of medicinal plants and herbs. A unique **Spice village** with exotic herbs and spices has also been created. Indoor plants are planted that act as air purifier in college campus.
- A Day care centre is in the pipeline. Presently this facility is availed at the neighboring college.
- A well equipped research centre at Physical Education Dept.
- A new teaching block for the Physical Education Dept.

#### **Two Best Practices**

- 1) HAMARI KAKSHA: A Class Apart is a registered nongovernmental organization (NGO) working in the field of 'education for all' since 2003. It is run by teachers and student volunteers and is aimed at giving special training & enhancing personalities, values and skills of underprivileged children, especially dropouts and low-performers, as well as their illiterate mothers. Our motto is 'Potential Unlimited' where not only is the latent talent of these children explored and tapped but also a platform is provided to the young volunteers to make them socially aware and responsible. Chandigarh Administration, Panchkula Administration and The Sai Trust have very kindly provided us space to run our four branches. More than 200 students of college has volunteered in the NGO since last three years.
- 2) Two Joint Job fests were organized in college campus.

**Ist Joint Job** Fest was organized in the month of Feb. 2016. More than **40 companies** from various sectors including IT, Banks, Retailing etc. visited the college. Approximately, 1600 students participated in the job fest out of which **709 were shortlisted** for different companies. Aviator Hub provided the Highest Package of 7,00,000/- to the students. **IInd Job Fest** was organized in the month of Sept 2016. **38 companies** participated in the job fest. **890 students were shortlisted** in this job fest. Candidates turned up in huge numbers for counselling offered by Army recruitment office Ambala Cantt.

#### "It is the first ever time that personnels from defence forces were invited to interact with aspirants of Armed Forces in the Job Fest.

The candidates were shortlisted on the basis of direct interviews, written tests, technical tests aptitude tests and group discussions. Most students preferred to enroll in banking, insurance, accounting, finance, sales and marketing, Aviation, software and web designing.

#### ROSHNI KI AUR

The group named Roshni Ki Aur was started in 2013. The main aim of this group is to promote a sense of dignity & self confidence among the differently abled persons with special reference to visually challenged persons. It is also meant to sensitize the different constituents of the society towards the need of these persons.

The group organizes different activities, events and programmes to attain the objectives. Activities include lectures, talks, dramas, cricket matches etc to attain a objects. This group is also concentrating to have an active interaction between normal and differently abled students of the college. Efforts are being made to involve number of people by organizing such events. In the era of inclusive education such groups can be very handy to achieve the goal of participative society in real sense of the term. The alumni association of the college is also contributing in this group. 29 students from the college in the year 2015-16 were given financial assistance by the alumni. Twenty students were placed in banking sector.
